THE SECOND SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY—YEAR C

The feast of the Epiphany directed our attention to the ways in which Christ is manifest in the Gospels, and by extension, how he is manifest in our lives. The theme of showing forth is continued in the Sundays after the Epiphany. Today's Gospel carries the third of the three classical themes of Epiphany: Jesus' first miracle, changing water into wine at the marriage feast in Cana of Galilee.

The Old Testament used the marriage relationship and the marriage feast as symbols or archetypes of God's relationship to the chosen people and of the ultimate consummation of that relationship in the establishment of the Kingdom. Today's passage from Isaiah is based on that image.

At the marriage feast, Jesus produced around 150 gallons of wine (God is lavish, even profligate, in giving grace) and it is much better wine than the host at the dinner had been serving (God's grace far surpasses what we can do for ourselves).

God's gifts of grace to us are also the focus of today's reading from 1 Corinthians. This reading is the first in a series from this Epistle exploring the kinds of gifts we received when we were baptized by water and the Holy Spirit, and the results of God's gifts in our lives.

We are a people transformed by our relationship to God and given the grace and illumination of the Holy Spirit. The marriage images in the first and third readings describe the intimate and total nature of God's relationship to us which results of the gift of the Holy Spirit given us in baptism.

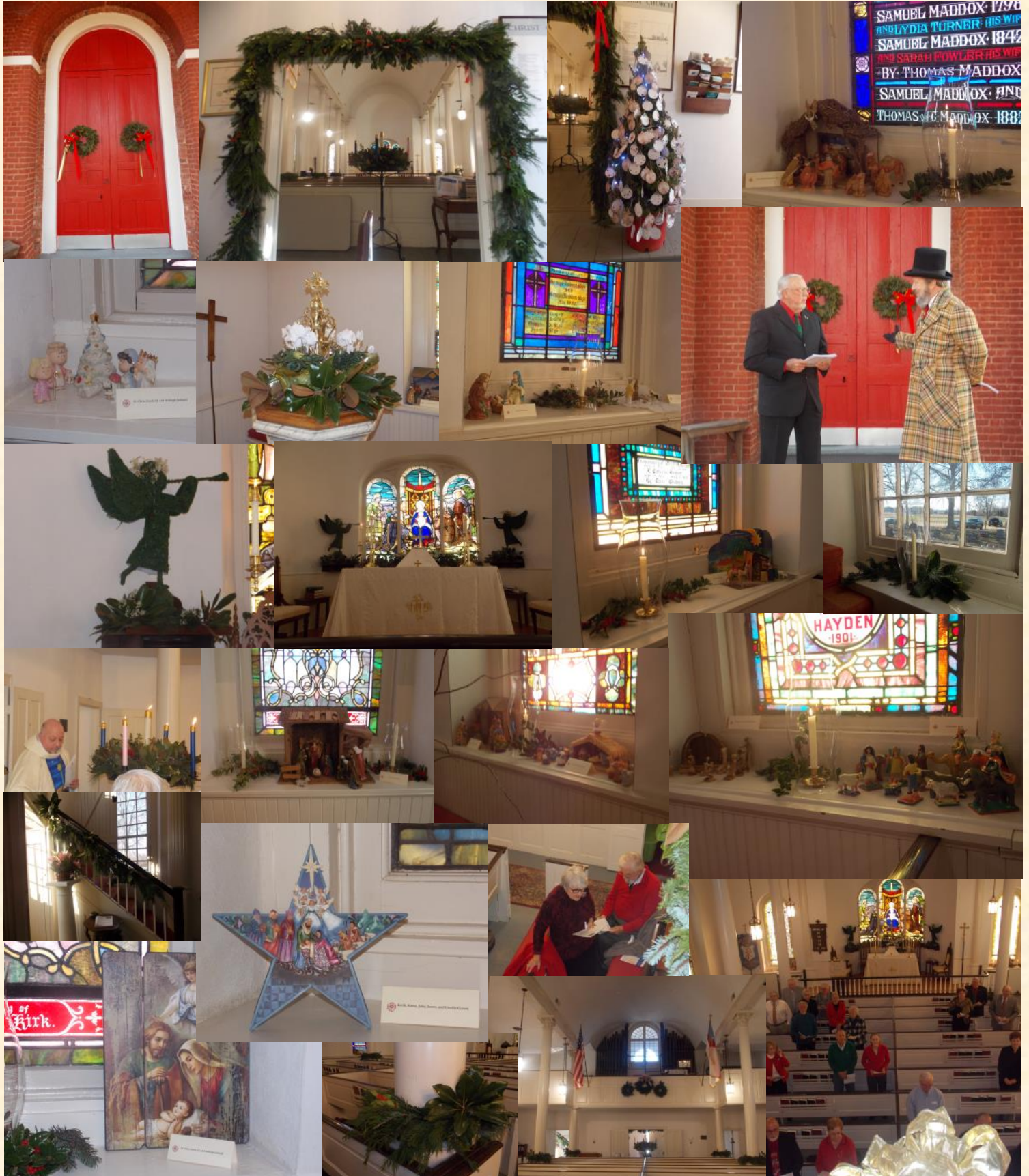

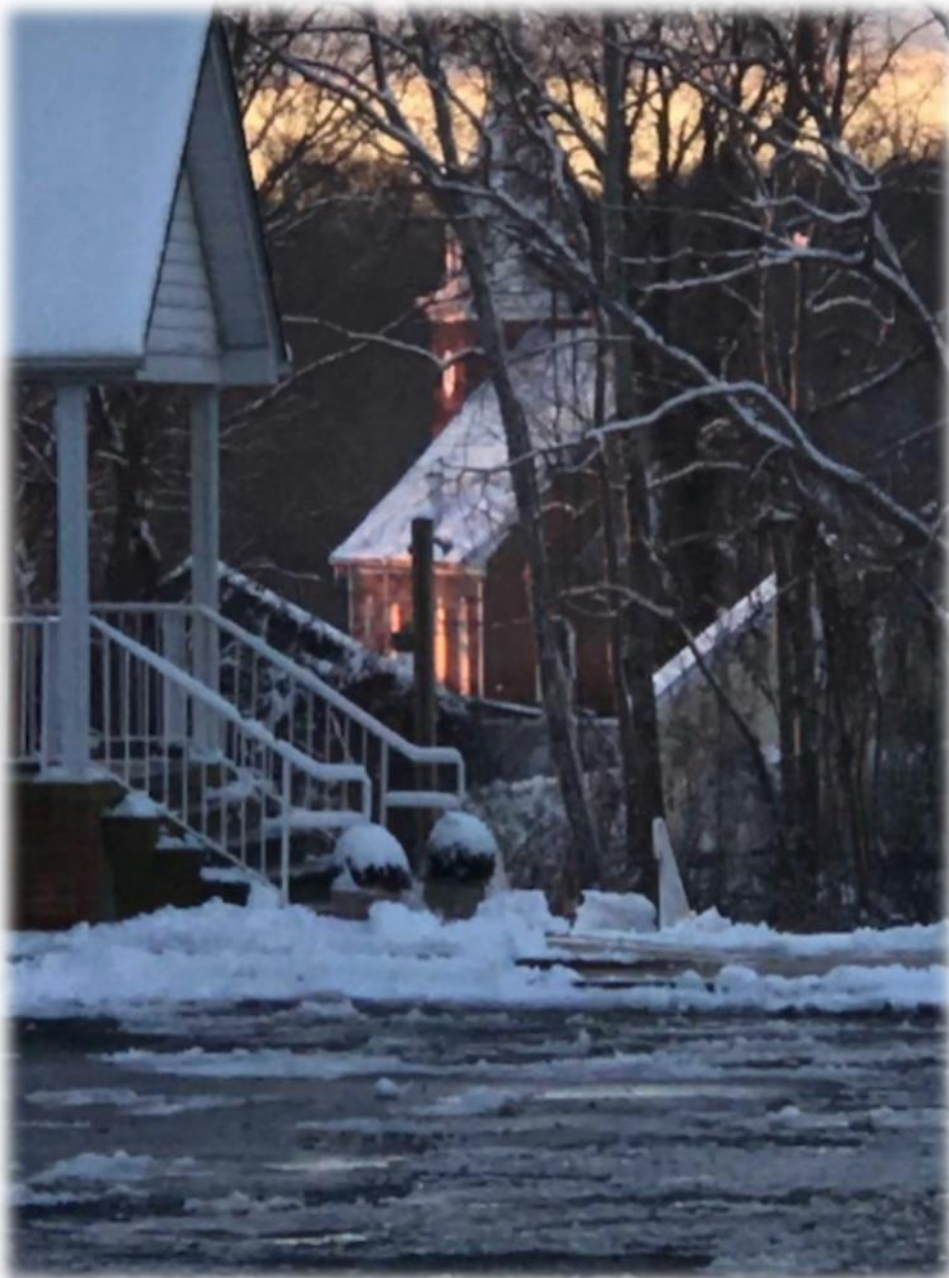

January 20, 2019 – Epiphany 2 (C) Diocese of Southwestern Virginia Revival

On January 27th, the Episcopal Diocese of Southwestern Virginia will host a revival at the Berglund Center Performing Arts Theater in Roanoke. The event will coincide with the diocese's hundredth annual convention. The theme of the convention and revival is *Still in the Mission Field: Following the Holy Spirit, Practicing the Way of Love*.

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, in a message to the diocese late last year, said, "Diocesan revivals have become a way in our church to renew our faith, renew our commitment, and, as that old hymn says, 'Claim the high calling angels cannot share—to young and old the gospel gladness bear.'"



Episcopal revivals, far from singular events in the life of a region, are preceded by substantial prayer, planning, and discernment of the ways the Holy Spirit is working in congregations, schools, and other ministries in the area. Through prayer groups in parishes and at the diocesan level, the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia is preparing the soil for growth in God's love.

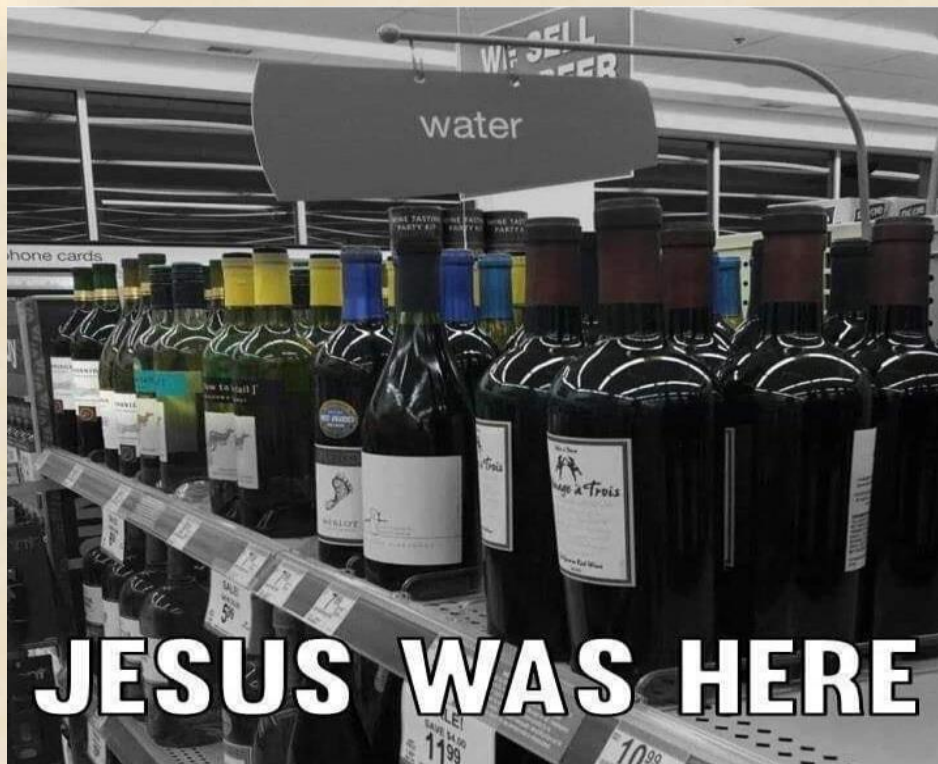
