The Calm During the Storm

Life is often like the weather. Some days we get to enjoy blue sunny skies with a light breeze. Some days are simply gray and gloomy. While other days are turbulent and stormy. Frequently storms appear out of nowhere and like a “whiteout” or a heavy downpour; they sometimes can blind us from seeing from what is right in front of us.

The storms in our lives are particularly painful because they seize hold of our emotions and then they begin to play on them. Like the storm story from our Gospel last Sunday, the anxiety, fear and emotions of the disciples got ratchettted up to such a high degree. Who would not be afraid of being in a sinking boat? Episcopal 101: A Deeper Understanding of Our Church

General Convention: The Episcopal Church's Family Reunion

Imagine Eucharist for 8,000 people. Imagine a marketplace of goods and ideas. Imagine quiet conversations among friends, old and new. Imagine one of the largest legislatures in the world. Imagine the utter silence of prayer before momentous decisions.

The every-third-year gathering of the Episcopal Church known as General Convention is all of these things. The 79th gathering begins in Austin, in the Diocese of Texas, on July 5 and continues until July 13. Bishops and deputies from the Episcopal Church will make broad decisions about policies and worship.

Those decisions take the form of resolutions agreed to by both the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops.

The House of Deputies ranges in size between 800 and 1,000 members. Its sessions are moderated by its elected president, a position held by the Rev. Gay Clark Jennings of the Diocese of Ohio. Each diocese is represented by up to eight elected deputies: four priests or deacons and four lay members.

Deputies cannot be instructed to vote one way or another. They agree to have an open heart so that they can prayerfully listen to others and be led by the Holy Spirit. And they cannot refuse to vote on an issue.

Most resolutions or other actions must pass by simple majorities in each house. Occasionally, the House of Deputies votes by orders, meaning that clergy and deputies vote separately and each order's votes are counted as one vote with the majority of those two votes being recorded as the vote. If the deputation's orders are evenly split, the vote counts as "no."

The House of Bishops consists of diocesan, suffragan, assisting and retired bishops. It will be led by the Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Michael Bruce Curry, who was elected at General Convention in 2015.

Resolutions come from the groups that carry out work authorized by the previous convention, and from bishops, dioceses, provinces (geographic collections of dioceses), and deputies. Before a resolution can come before either house, it must be considered by a committee, which hears public testimony and makes recommendations on whether that resolution will be presented.



Convention is more than legislation. All business stops each day so that everyone can join in the Holy Eucharist.

In the exhibit hall, organizations and interest groups present their wares, recruit members and do their best to influence legislation. Many church-related organizations hold meetings in conjunction with Convention, including the Episcopal Church Women, who hold their Triennial Meeting concurrently.

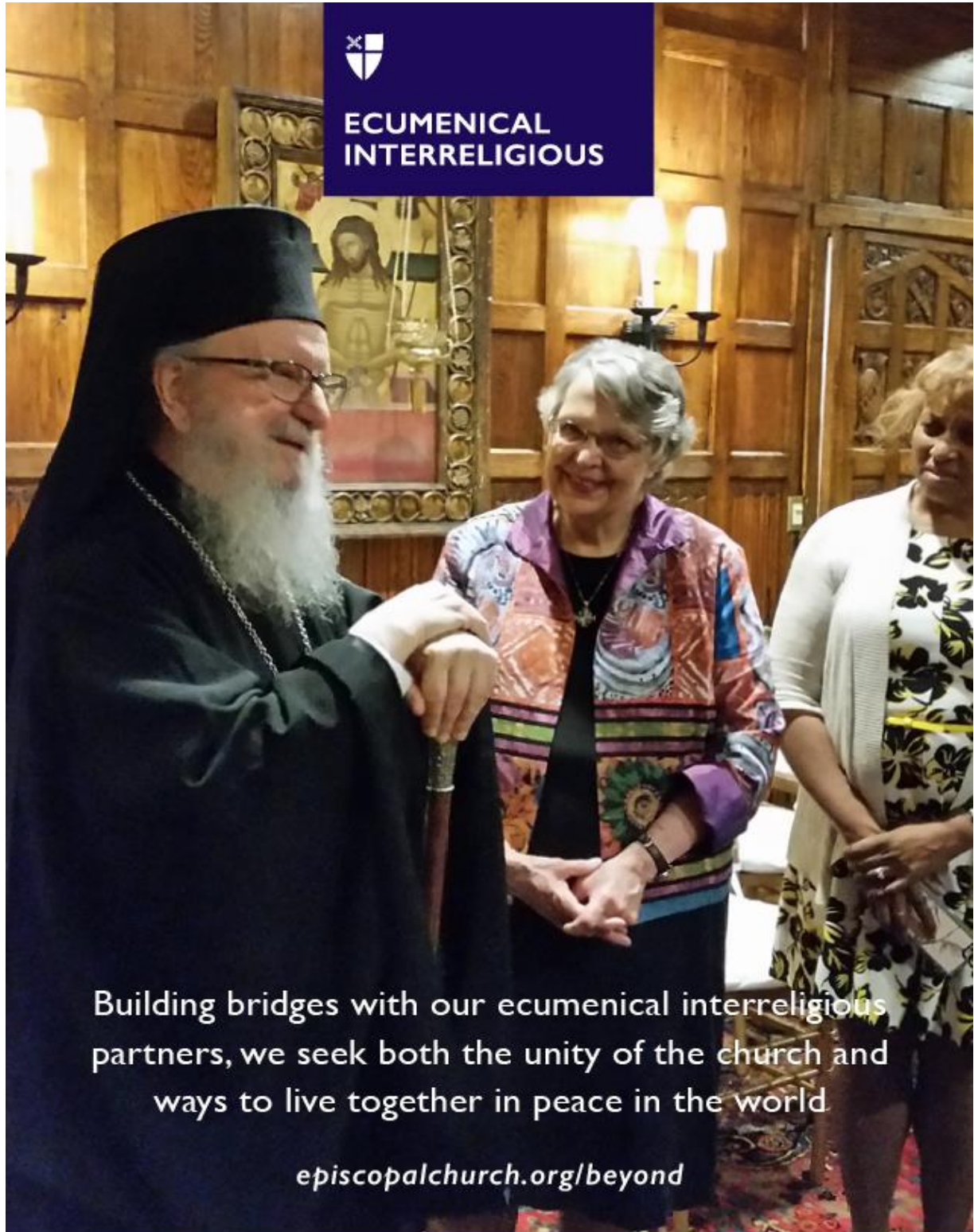

STORY BEHIND THE SONG: 'GOD BLESS AMERICA'

Our nation's solemn prayer and appeal has become, "God Bless America," particularly since the events of Sept. 11, 2001 in New York City. Following those attacks, U.S. senators and members of the House of Repre-

sentatives gathered on the steps of the Capitol Building and sang this musical petition. It has become a part of the seventh-inning stretch at major league baseball games, and is heard at countless other venues.

During an Armistice Day celebration in 1939, Kate Smith first sang this Irving Berlin song, launching it on a flight across the U.S. It is reported that she hesitated to include the song in her program, fearing she might be called a "flag waver." However, she decided to include it and, as a result, became famous.

Irving Berlin, the author of the song, was born Israel Baline in Eastern Russia on May 11, 1888. Young Israel was exposed to music early in life: his father, Moses Baline, was a cantor in the synagogue. The family moved to New York in 1893 to escape the massacre and slaughter in Russia.

By 1907 Berlin had published his first song. In 1911 he wrote his first big, international hit, "Alexander's Ragtime Band." This success followed Irving's days as a singing waiter in a China Town cafe in New York City. Over the next 50 years he wrote hundreds of songs, including "White Christmas" and "Always."

From the peaceful Atlantic, which bathes our eastern shores, to the restless Pacific in the West, and from the massive Great Lakes in the north to the winding Rio Grande that borders us to the south, you'll find what we lovingly call America.

More than any nation on earth, we are a diverse population, gathered from the four corners of the world, working together to make America a unique and unparalleled nation in which to live and move and have our being.

If you have ever had the privilege of approaching the U.S. through New York Harbor, "Lady Liberty" came into your view. This grand statue was erected just seven years before Irving Berlin's family reached these shores as immigrants. There is no message on any plaque in America that is more often quoted and which has a more solemn and significant intent, "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free ... Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me ..."

In this message America offers to share her blessings with people of every hue, nationality and ethnic origin - people who want to live free in this great land of opportunity.

Irving was not a shallow patriot. He donated millions of dollars in royalties to worthy youth organizations in America. In his late years he was presented the Congressional Gold Metal and the Medal of Freedom.

Irving Berlin died in his sleep at his home in New York City on Sept. 22, 1989, at the age of 101.

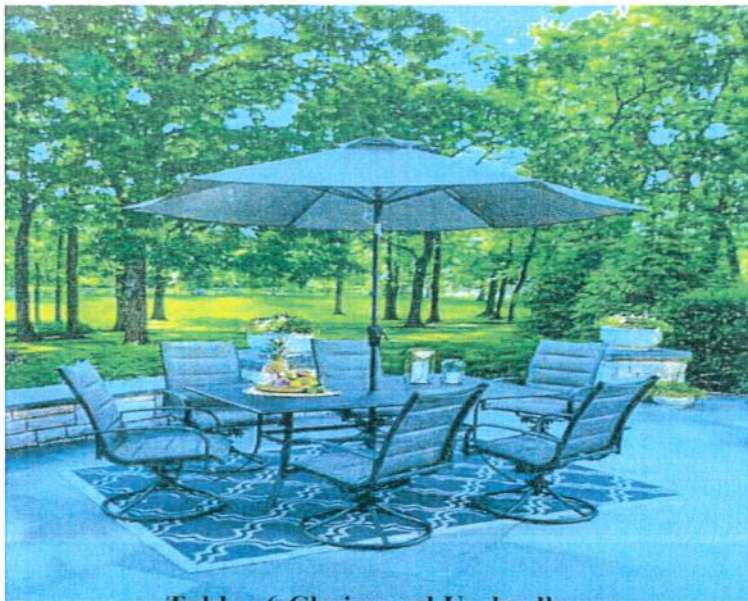

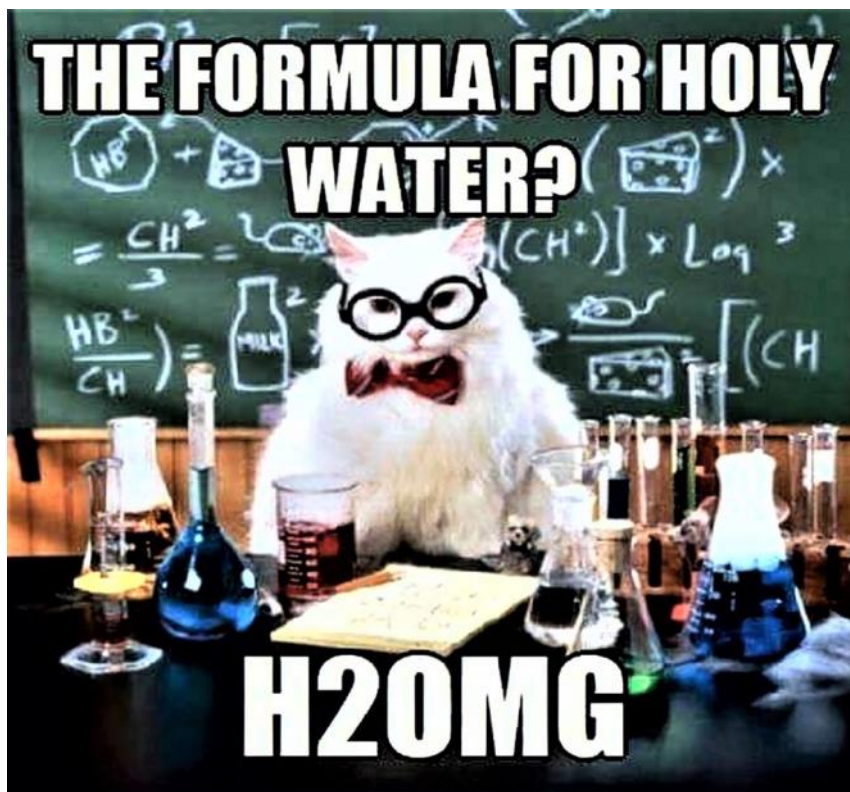
