Participants will convene at the Harvest House porch before embarking on a 3 mile route. Last year the Hunger Fund Walks raised over \$5,000. 100% of the money was distributed to agencies that supply food to the region's hungry, impoverished children and adults in the form of grants. Our goal this year is to reach \$7,000 so that the Hunger Fund committee may increase the grants it distributes. All undesignated cash in the offering plate on Sunday will go towards the Hunger Fund.



REFLECTIONS ON THIS SUNDAY'S READINGS

(OCT 20, 2019) THE NINETEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST—PROPER 24, YEAR C

Welcome to Christ Church. Today, Jesus uses a parable to teach about prayer. In it, an unjust judge grants his petitioner's plea only because she will not leave him alone until he does. Jesus says that God will also grant the prayers of those who cry to God day and night. The point is not that God, like the judge, will only be responsive to those who nag. It is, as Luke says, to teach us the need to pray always and not lose heart.

We continue with Jeremiah today. His word from God is a solemn promise by God to restore Israel and Judah. God promises in the days still to come to make a new covenant with the people, a covenant that



will be written in their hearts. Never again, God promises, will they be ignorant of God's will and God will forgive all their sins.

In today's reading from the second letter to Timothy, this early church leader is called to persevere in teaching and preaching the faith he has been given both by his family and in his study of the scriptures. This letter was written in a time when an aberrant form of Christianity was being proclaimed. Timothy is to stick with what he has learned from the scriptures and from Paul.

Our baptism has called us into a life characterized by the need never to give up our search for God. Faithfulness involves a giving of all that we are and all that we have. God asks us never to lose heart and to give all of our time, treasure, and talents to the ministry of God in this world.

Hymn Story—Wade in the Water

By Calvin Earl

***Wade In The Water is one of the spirituals that has many secret codes embedded within the song apart from the lyrics referencing the Christian tradition of baptism. Often the religious rite of sprinkling water onto a person's forehead or of the immersion of a person's body in water, or as the Bible tells the story of John the Baptist baptized people in the river it symbolizes purification and choosing to live your life in the Christian faith.

***For the slaves in addition to their faith in God, secret codes were used in the spirituals to give guidance to the slave as he embarked on his journey to freedom on the Underground Railroad. The secret code in 'Wade in the water, God's gonna trouble the water' for the slaves trying to escape from slavery on the Underground Railroad, meant to be aware that one of the methods used by the slave masters to track runaway slaves down was to send their bloodhounds out to track down the slave. So the lyrics were instruction for the runaway slave if they could hear the bloodhounds were close behind they needed to find a body of water and wade in water, because if you were in water the bloodhounds could no longer pick up their scent and the slave would be safe from the dogs tracking them down.

***Also in the lyrics 'See that band all dressed in red, looks like the band that Moses led' -It is thought that the lyrics reference Harriet Tubman whose nickname was 'Moses of her people'. Many of the spirituals lyrics have dual meanings in the songs and in this song Moses and Harriet Tubman's names were interchangeable because Harriet like the story in the Bible where Moses led the slaves to freedom, Harriet did the same for the slaves in the 1800's in America.

***In the last verse of Wade in the Water the lyrics are: If you don't believe I've been redeemed, follow me down to Jordan's stream – In the Bible there are several references to the Jordan River, and what the Jordan River meant to the slaves here in America was the secret code name for the Ohio River. If the slave could get across the Ohio River he or she would be free.

***Not only could the lyrics have instruction for the slave, it was also important to note the tone of the singer of the song. Both the lyrics and the tone in 'if you don't believe I've been redeemed' was meant to be a dare or a challenge for you to face your fears because if you dared to cross the Ohio river you would be free or as the slaves put it you will be 'redeemed'.

***And with most spirituals including Wade in the Water you can sense that the slave is completely trusting God to deliver justice either now or in heaven and that they believed and found real hope in God's promise that if 'you ask it shall be given'.



October 20, 2019 – Pentecost 19 (C) United Nations Commission on the Status of Women

Applications are being accepted for Episcopal delegates to represent the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church at the 64th Session of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW) in New York City, March 9th – 20th, 2020.

The Episcopal delegation will consist of one delegate from each province of The Episcopal Church and one delegate from the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe. The Episcopal delegation aims to be representative of the entire Episcopal Church. Priority will be given to church leaders who have used the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action as a platform for their ministry, or plan to do so in future ministry.

Episcopal delegates will observe the official UNCSW meetings at United Nations headquarters and will represent the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church through their advocacy at the United Nations. They will be expected to participate in conference calls prior to UNCSW and evaluations, reports and follow-up actions once back home.

The 2020 UNCSW session will focus on Beijing +25, the 25th anniversary of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action. The session will review and appraise its implementation and will assess current challenges affecting the implementation of the Platform for Action, the achievement of gender equality, the empowerment of women and its contribution towards the full realization of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Applicants of any gender must be at least 19 years old, able to speak to the theme, and willing to participate in advocacy at UNCSW. Youth (ages 15-18) also may apply to be youth delegates, but must be accompanied by an adult chaperone, preferably a parent or legal guardian.

Applicants should have a relevant role at the parish, diocesan and/or provincial level, be accountable to a diocesan or provincial authority, and have a process for reporting back to the local community after participating in UNCSW.

Delegates will be expected to be present in New York City for the UNSCW meeting between March 6 - 20 or as close to the entire stay as possible. Delegates will be responsible for their own travel, housing, program expenses and fundraising. A limited amount of scholarship funding may be available to support candidates who might not otherwise be able to attend due to financial constraints. Following a review of the applications, the delegates will be chosen by Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop Michael Curry. All applicants will be notified by mid-November.


